POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

How quickly the seasons change! I hope all of you have been able to get out and enjoy the beautiful Wisconsin autumn weather.

I am very pleased to say, that as I monitor crime trends in the area, that the Village has experienced significantly less crime than the neighborhoods in close proximity and other municipalities. Officers from the Maple Bluff Police Department will continue to be proactive in our patrols to discourage criminal activity.

The use of heroin in Dane County has risen at a fast and furious pace that is so alarming. Heroin doesn't allow for "experimental use" and the drug dealers are very aggressive, giving "samples" to individuals who are struggling to overcome their addictions. Please be very aware of just how dangerous this drug is.

Now that I'm on the topic of danger, there has been a lot of attention recently about cyber bullying. The best defense is a good offense; keep your lines of communication open with your children. The most important part of that communication is listening to your children. I strongly suggest that if your children have Facebook or other social networking options, make it a condition that you have access to that site and monitor what may be posted there.

A little less known, but becoming more prevalent almost daily is cyber stalking. The amazing information highway unfortunately allows way too much personal information to be out there. In a recent case, a former boyfriend who lives hours/miles away has been stalking this young woman through 3rd parties. False Facebook accounts were set up using her identity and vicious and crude postings were made on those accounts.

There have been cases documented that burglaries were committed when individuals had posted their vacation plans on their Facebook pages.

Be very careful using Craig's list as well. There are people out there who don't seem to have enough to do with their time and are harassing people who have placed ads or who have responded to postings on Craig's list.

As we approach the Holiday Season I feel compelled to return to the traditional cautions as well. Don't leave valuables in your vehicle, especially not in plain sight. Keep your vehicle locked, yes, even in your garage.

When out shopping, be prepared with your keys when you leave the store. Don't be digging for keys with your arms full at your vehicle in a parking lot. If there is someone suspicious near your vehicle, return to the store and request an employee or even mall security to escort you to your vehicle. Most retail stores will try very hard to keep their customers safe.

I'm not sure I'm ready to use the "snow" word; I'm still enjoying the mild weather. But, please keep in mind that if there is snow in the weather forecast, on-street overnight parking will not be an option. Plan on giving yourself extra time to arrive at your destination safely. It seems to take a couple slippery driving days before Wisconsin motorists successfully convert to winter driving techniques.

PUBLIC WORKS NEWS

The 2010 CIP has run its course. All of the heavy equipment installation has long been accomplished, even the landscaping is done. There are a number of adjustments to address, such as mailbox placement or landscape details, most of which should be satisfied this fall. There will continue to be observations taken from now until next spring and a punch list generated for additional attention to the finer details as deemed necessary. I would like to thank everyone who displayed patience and understanding during a most disruptive process. A consistent report of mutual admiration from residents and contractor staff toward one another was expressed throughout the year. I would like to echo that sentiment.

With the completion of this street and utility project, keep in mind the adjustments that have been made to some of the road widths and alignments of intersections. The roads were designed to be more uniform, providing for a consistent width or surface for a given street. The intersections were designed to bring traffic under control and perform a stop and turn, allowing for motorists to see bicyclists, pedestrians as well as other motorists more clearly.

With the narrowing of some roadways, service providers need to be alerted to no parking zones or placement of equipment so as to not inhibit traffic movement. Also, there is a requirement to obtain a permit if a service provider is going to occupy street and right of way with oversized equipment or materials.

The fall season is upon us, collection of leaves and garden debris will be this department's priority for the month of November. It is recommended to have the bulk of leaves out to the roads edge for collection for the week of the 15th. We will be collecting for the entire month weather permitting. While we will be collecting the week of Thanksgiving, keep in mind that it is a short work week for this department and also a week that could bring any manner of weather.

As a reminder:

There is an ordinance that prohibits placement of leaves and yard waste in the street. Proper placement of all collectables is on the terrace away from obstructions such as poles or mailboxes. Keep unlike materials separated to facilitate collection processes. Pet waste is to be flushed down your toilet.

Small amounts of building demolition material are collected with rubbish.

The county Clean Sweep program is closed for the season. They will reopen next spring. These items will no longer be collected by the village. Collection of appliances have a fee, you may purchase a collection sticker at the Village Center.

The recently installed water meter reading devices will allow the village to bill quarterly starting in 2011. With the radio read capabilities this process will streamline this change. Another capability of these appliances is the ability to download water flow history that may lend insight in identifying an in home leak. As a department, we have the highest level of confidence for this product's performance and accuracy. We will continue to honor a request for testing a meter for accuracy, however, there will be an administrative fee associated with this process when the meter tested is found to be accurate. A simple in home water audit is easily performed, and this we will continue to help residents with, at no charge. Please keep in mind that there are 5 elements that generate your water bill. There is a water base fee determined by meter size; sewer base fee determined by meter size; water usage; sewer usage (determined by water usage); fire protection determined by meter size.

Winter weather isn't far away, be prepared! Did you replace that broken shovel? Or how about that ice scraper and snow melt? Do not forget to remove garden hoses from the hose bib and or winterize an irrigation system. Please remember that snow is to remain on property, this is also an ordinance, no

blowing of snow out onto roadways or your neighbors driveway. Sidewalks need to be cleared from edge to edge within 24 hrs. Also give the department time to finish your roadway before final clearing of aprons and mailboxes.

Holiday trees will be collected the month of January.

Have a great holiday season, stay warm and enjoy the weather!

For use on your 2010 Income Tax Return, tax bill payments must be received in the Maple Bluff Administration Office by Friday, December 31, 2010. Post-marked tax bills with a date on or before Friday, December 31, 2010 will also be accepted. Full Tax Bill payments are due to the Village of Maple Bluff by Monday, January 31, 2011. If you are paying in installments, the first half is due to the Village of Maple Bluff by Monday, January 31, 2011, and the second installment is due to the Dane County Treasurer by Sunday, July 31, 2011.

LEAD IN YOUR HOME

In 2008, The State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services reported that children living in Wisconsin are at higher risk for lead poisoning than children living in most other states. The single greatest contributing factor for the increased risk in this state is that approximately 25 percent of all homes in Wisconsin were built before 1950. Lead paint is likely to be found in buildings or houses built before 1950, or in buildings or houses built before 1978 that are undergoing renovations. Lead paint is easily recognizable as either peeling or chipping paint, commonly described as looking similar to alligator skin.

Typically, the effects of lead poisoning are unseen in young children; however, by the time children reach school age, the effects of lead poisoning become apparent and can last a lifetime. A child who was lead poisoned when they were toddlers are at risk for learning disabilities, attention deficit-hyperactivity disorder, abnormal maturation of their bodies, dropping out of high school, and aggression.

The only way to know if a child is lead poisoned is to have them tested by their doctor. If high levels of lead are detected, the typical treatment is simply eliminating or reducing exposure to the source of lead and continuing to test children until they are no longer poisoned.

Getting Help

Sanitarians from the Public Health Department of Madison and Dane County provide free home inspections and renovation information for households with children less than 6 years old testing at 5 micrograms per deciliter or higher. Please call Brian Odegaard, Public Health Nurse for Madison and Dane County, at 242-6332 for more information.

Getting Financial Help

Project Home and Common Wealth Development, Inc. have teamed up with the State of Wisconsin Department of Commerce and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services to offer lead hazard reduction services as part of a national effort to reduce the exposure of children of low and moderate-income families to the hazards of lead paint. These grants are designed to cover up to 75 percent of the cost of controlling lead hazards in your home, which includes lead testing and risk assessment. Both owner-occupied and rental properties are eligible for assistance. To be eligible, residents must meet the following criteria:

- Your apartment, house or condo was built before 1978
- You have children under 6 years old who live or regularly spend time in your home (e.g., child care)
- Children under 6 who are *living* in the home must get a blood lead test before work begins
- Home owner or landlord must be willing to participate in the requirements of the program
- You must meet income guidelines. See chart: (Next Page)
